

## **Evan and Jane Philips - Lived in Ohio County, Virginia 1780s to 1800.**

PHILLIPS, EVAN : Evan Phillips was born in Wales about 1760. His place of birth is based upon an interview provided by his great grandson who was a Doctor in eastern Ohio, located in the Belmont County History published in 1889. This interview indicates that Evan Phillips, Jr. (son of the above Evan Phillips) was born in Maryland to parents born in Wales. The Elder Evan married Jane Unknown (She named a daughter Jane Latimer Phillips so I suspect her maiden name was Latimer, but have no proof of that.) about 1782 and died in Belmont County, Ohio by January 1824.

Evan is shown on the 1785/6, 1790/91 and 1795 Property Tax Lists of Ohio County, Virginia (currently West Virginia) as well as 1802, 1803 and 1805 Belmont County Tax List with 160 acres in Richland Township. Evan purchased his Belmont County land the sixth day of May, 1799. The transaction and deed were executed in Jefferson County, Ohio. This deed states that Evan was from the County of Ohio and State of Virginia. Also it states that he paid five hundred and sixty dollars in cash for the property, which was a large sum of money for that time.

According to a History of Belmont County Evan, Enoch and John Phillips were early settlers of Belmont County, Ohio. Enoch might be his son, but his son John would have been too young to be listed separately. Thus the Enoch and John referred to probably are some other relative. In fact both John and Enoch are probably his brothers or other relatives. In 1817 a David Phillips from Loudoun County, Virginia also moved to Belmont County, Ohio. He is possibly another brother since I feel he is the David Phillips who was a witness for Jane Phillips' Will. Since I wrote the above I have taken a DNA test to prove genealogy paternity. A descendant of the previous mentioned David Phillips also had a paternity DNA test. Our two results showed that we were not related for several generations back. This can mean that Evan and David were not closely related (or related at all). It can also mean that one of our Phillips grandfathers was not the father of one of our other grandfathers that are shown as his child or one of our grandfathers was adopted thus one of us would have a "non-Phillips" DNA.

The "History of Belmont and Jefferson Counties, Ohio" by J.A. Caldwell of 1880 states that Evan probably settled there in the 1790's. It further states that Evan and his family lived in the Wheeling (West Virginia) Fort during the Indian troubles. The "Indian Troubles" began with the first settlers to cross the Allegheny Mountains and ended, east of the Ohio River following the Treaty of Greenville of 1795. The killing continued in Ohio until the end of the War of 1812 and the removal of the Indians west of the Mississippi River.

At the time of his death Evan still owned the 160 acres of land in Richland Township, Belmont County, Ohio. His son Enoch who had moved to Guernsey County, Ohio, preceded him in death.

Evan's wife, Jane was born between 1775 and 1794 based upon the 1820 Belmont, Ohio census. She died before June 1825 in Belmont County, Ohio.

Both Evan and Jane left Wills and Bible records that described their children and their possessions. These Wills were filed in Belmont County, Ohio. Copies of their Wills follow:

#### LETTERS OF ADMINISTRATION ON THE ESTATE OF EVAN PHILLIPS DECEASED

At a Court of Common Pleas begun and held at St. Clairsville in and for the County of Belmont on the 22nd day of March AD 1824 before the Honorable Jermiah H Hallack President and Edward Bryson(?), John Wiley and Alexander (?) Associate Judges of said Court.

Upon Application the Court do appoint Jane Phillips and Eli Nichols Administrator over all and singular the goods and chattels, rights and credits, monies and effects of Evan Phillips late of Belmont County deceased upon their entering into Bond with Security in the sum of two thousand dollars conditioned for the faithful performance of their Trust and Levi Pickering and William Askew being offered as Security are accepted by the Court. Whereupon it is ordered that Letters of Administration (?) to the said Jane Phillips and Eli Nichols Administrators as aforesaid and the Court do appoint Thomas White, John Stewart and George Armstrong Appraisers to Appraise the Personal Property of the said deceased. Note: The sons of the deceased having declined the acceptance of the appointment as Administration in Open Court. Administration Affirmed in Open Court.

The above was followed by a standard Letter of Administration prepared by the Clerk of the Court Esu Ellis which was dated 1 April, 1824.

This document is located in Belmont County, Ohio Will Book B, Page 461.

Also in Will Book B, Pages 547/549 is "An Inventory and Apraisement of the Goods and Chattels of the Estate of Evan Philips deceased Taken April 9, 1824" and "Memorandum of Particulars received by the heirs of Evan Phillips deceased before his death and of which the said deceased made no account" .

The Inventory (Pages 547/548) follows and amounted to \$783.58 3/4:

Two daughters (Ruhanna and Matilda) failed to sign this document or apparently receive any benefits, while John Westley Starr signed for the children of Enoch Philips, deceased. Ruhanna was the next to oldest daughter and lived in Guernsey County, Ohio at the time of Evan's death. I do not know why she was not included. Matilda was the youngest and a minor, which may explain why she was not included. John Phillips signed, but I found no evidence he received any benefits.

Jane Philips' will was dated 15 April, 1825 follows. This Will was witnessed by Thomas White and David Philips, Senior. Since her son David Philips did not have a son by the name David (at least that survived to be recorded or possibly a son that went by his middle name) I assume this was the other David Philips that lived in Belmont County at this time. He moved to Belmont County from Loudoun County, Virginia in 1817 and was about the same age as Evan (Jane's deceased husband). He also died in 1825 (in the fall) in Belmont County, Ohio

Ezer Ellis, clerk, as aforesaid do by these presents by order of said Court commit unto you full power and authority over all and Singular the goods & Chattels, rights & credits, monies & Effects of the said deceased will and faithfully to dispose of the same according to the said last Will and Testament as also to ask gather recover and receive all and every debt whatsoever of the said deceased which to her whilst the living and at the time of her death did ascertain you are also to pay and discharge all and Singular the debts dues and demands, which the said deceased at the time of her death (including her funeral expenses) Stood bound to pay according to the Laws of the State so far as the goods & Chattels, rights, & Credits, monies, & Effects come to your hands will extend and for that purpose you are to call on each creditor of the deceased by publick advertisement to exhibit to you their several claims within one year from this date you are also to make (make) out a true and perfect Inventory of all and Singular the goods & Chattels of the said deceased and have the same appraised by George Keller, Thomas White, & George Armstrong, appraisers appointed by the court and exhibit the same together with a correct list of the rights & credits monies and Effects of the said dead to the clerk of said county within three months and you are also to make out and remain to said court a true and accurate account of your administration Eighteen Months from this date unless further time is granted by the Court.

Copy of Jane Philips's Will, Belmont County Will Book C, page 63, 1825

I Jane Philips Senior being of sound mind and memory do make and publish this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following (that is to say):

First I direct and order that my Just debts and funeral charges and expenses and all other charges necessarily arising out of the legal Administration of this my Will shall in the first place



be paid and fully satisfied. In the second place and after the full payment of all just debts and charges as above my Will is that my daughter Ruhannah McCoy have and receive the full sum of One Hundred Dollars, that my Grandchildren Margaret Philips, Jane Philips, and George Philips, heirs of my son Enoch Phillips, deceased have and receive the full sum of Fifty cent each, and that the balance be it more or less of my goods and Chattels, rights and demands, whatsoever be divided equally share and share alike between my eight children namely: David, William, Evan, John, Mary and Matilda Philips, and Nancy Braton (this is the way it is written in the copy of Jane's will, but Nancy's married name was Barton) and Jane Knight.

And lastly I will order and direct that there be no public venue made of my Property but that it be Indifferently appraised by my two friends Thomas White and George Keller and after my afore named debts and funeral and other necessary charges shall have been paid I Will and direct that my afore named friends make an equitable division of all of my Property agreeably to this my Will and according to the appeasement of them made giving and Getting off first my Daughter Ruhannah the sum of One Hundred Dollars afore named and willed to her. Secondly to my Grand Children Margaret, Jane and George Philips the sum of fifty cents each as before mentioned and thirdly equally divide the balance share or less share and share alike between my eight remaining children namely: David Philips, William Philips, John Philips, Evan Philips, Mary Philips, Matilda Philips, Nancy Braton and Jane Knight and that said division extend not only to the property appraised but to all monies dues and demands whatsoever remaining after the discharge of my debts and other charges as before described, and it is also my full and decided meaning and intention that in case of any dispute or controversy whatsoever in any way arising out of about or respecting this Will that they my two friends, Thomas White and George Keller, believing their Judgment in such dispute or disputes in writing with their names subscribed thereto shall finally end such dispute or disputes, and before the same force and effect as though it had been by me particularly expressed and I do make and appoint John Philips my son executor of this my Last Will and Testament. In witness I have hereunto set my hand and seal the fifteenth day of April in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and twenty five.

Said Margaret and husband, Jane and husband, George Phillips and his guardian, David Phillips and William Phillips reside in the county of Morgan or Guernsey. The said Nancy Barnes and her husband and Evan Phillips reside in Belmont Co. your petitioner has purchased from said Jane Knight and Matilda Phillips and they have conveyed to him their share and interest in said land. Petitioner is seized of 3/8 of said land and prays for partition.-Page 189- partition ordered-June term, 1829 - plat of land is on page 192.

Even(sic) and Jane Phillips' Family Bible was copied in April, 1986 by Donna M Wilson of Canton, Ohio who's husband is a descendant of Evan and Jane Philips. The entries relating to their children follow:

ANN PHILLIPS daughter of EVEN and JANE PHILLIPS was born the 5th day of April and the 7th day of the week about 4 O. Clock in the morning in the year of our Lord 1783.

DAVID AND ENOCH PHILLIPS was born the 22nd day of October the first day of the week about 10 O Clock in the morning 1786.

JANE PHILLIPS was born the 2nd day of March the 4th day of the week in the year of our Lord 1791.

WILLIAM PHILLIPS was born the 5th day of January and the 5th day of the week about nine O Clock in the morning in the year of our Lord 1797.

EVEN PHILLIPS was born the 1st day of September and the 1st day of the week in the year of our Lord 1799.

JOHN PHILLIPS was born the 2nd day of October and the 7th day of the week in the year of our Lord 1802.

MATILDA PHILLIPS was born February the 4th day of the month and the 4th day of the week in the year of our Lord 1807.
